2. Approval of Last Meetings Minutes

3. Business arising from previous minutes

- Re-designating the Eutrophication and Undesirable Algae BUI and the Degradation of Aesthetics BUI (on Canadian side of SMR). Members agree that an endorsment letter should be drafted and presented at the next meeting.
- Action items that were re-visited:
 - Coastal wetlands initiative In relation to MNR's presentation on coastal wetlands, and the BPAC discussion during the April meeting, there was discussion about developing a potential partnership with other like-minded organizations. The BPAC's role could be to serve as an advisory panel but developing a partnership may not be in the scope of the current RAP initiative.
 - Post RAP initiative Important to discuss and start brainstorming about what will happen post RAP. Some discussion on timelines. Potentially could still be a long time before delisting. The example discussed was Marathan Harbour's sand and aggregate capping of contaminated soils project. Although the results seem promising, there will likely be a long observation period. As decisions for sediment mangement in the St. Marys River have yet to be realized, delisting will unlikely be in the near future.
 - Inquiry about work with sedimentation work Sediment management task team will begin to have meetings once the fish tumour study results are in. Dredging is a concern but natural recovery seems to be happening.
 - Implementation Annex review no comments were received from BPAC members other than Mike Ripley. Mike's comments were addressed and the document can be found on the BPAC website. A meeting was held with the SSMRCA concerning actions FF2 & FF3. In brief, the SSMRCA was not against certain activities/projects taking place as long as they do not impede flood control. Discussion revolved around innovative ways to naturalize flood control areas and the potential for organizations to gain funding for projects.

6. Agency Updates

Environment & Climate Change Canada (ECCC)

Degradation of Aesthetics BUI and Eutrophication/Undesirable Algae BUI

 Based on the multi-year water quality study (2013-15) by Algoma University to evaluate the current status of the two BUIs, the subsequent discussions with BPAC (including the September 22 meeting) and the comments submitted to project-lead Carrie Ginou, a redesignation report for both BUIs is being prepared by ECCC and will be sent to BPAC for review and comment in November.

Fish Tumours

• ECCC is waiting for the final analysis of liver samples taken from 100 White Suckers collected last summer. The evaluation is underway by the B.C. Ministry of Agriculture. As of October 25, the lab completed examination of 10 of the 100 samples, and none were found to have tumours. But conclusions as to the tumour rate will come when the lab work is completed in December.

Loss of Fish & Wildlife Habitat BUI

- As noted at the June 2016 BPAC meeting, ECCC-Canadian Wildlife Service has completed a final report on its multi-year study on the condition of coastal wetlands and wildlife populations (breeding marsh birds, amphibians, aquatic macroinvertebrates) on the Canadian side of the AOC. It concludes coastal wetland habitat and biotic communities are Not Impaired, thus satisfying the wildlife component of the BUI delisting criteria (i.e., *coastal wetland wildlife habitat conditions within the AOC are comparable to those of suitable reference sites, as assessed using an index of biotic integrity*). The report has been shared with BPAC, and the study results and BUI delisting criteria will be discussed at the November BPAC meeting with study lead Angela Darwin, who presented the initial results to BPAC in June 2015.
- The other BUI component is for fish habitat (i.e., *enhance rapids/aquatic habitat conditions through feasible conservation and restoration measures identified in the Stage 2 RAP*).
 ECCC commissioned a study to determine the feasibility of undertaking several options, and has been in discussions with the Batchewana First Nation regarding possible next steps for an aquatic habitat restoration project on Whitefish Island, adjacent to the "Big Rapids".

Environmental Damages Fund (EDF)

 The next deadline to submit a proposal for the Environmental Damages Fund (EDF) is January 31, 2017. Funding is available for projects which address EDF's priority issues of restoration, environmental quality improvement, research, and education & awareness. Specific to the current funding that's available now in Ontario (applications are due January 31, 2017); the EDF will provide: 1) up to \$14,000 for projects with the specified purpose of the protection and/or conservation of species in northern Ontario, including but not limited to the Algoma area; and 2) up to \$131,250 for projects with the specified purpose of promoting the conservation and protection fish and fish habitat in northwestern or northeastern Ontario. Ontario Ministry of the Environment & Climate Change (MOECC)

On October 3, Michelle McChristie changed positions in the MOECC Thunder Bay office, ending her role as the provincial co-lead for the St. Marys River AOC (and Lake Superior LAMP). A staffing process is underway.

United States Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA)

The Little Rapids bridge work will be complete in mid-November 2016 along with substantial completion of the project. The contractors poured the bridge deck and railings and the HMA paving and should be totally complete along with the pavement markings. The traffic will be shifted onto the bridge in the next week or so and then the temporary road and construction area will be removed. Additionally, all river work will be completed in 2016.

In spring of 2017 there will be some follow up paving, clean up and restoration. The 2017 paving will be an extra top layer on the road sections leading up to the bridge; there were areas called out for 1.5 inches of overlay that need to be completed in the spring after all the other work is done. The Road Commission invited MDEQ to look at the plans and they are keeping the turbidity curtain in place on the south side in case of disturbances. However, the removal should involve larger particles and rock so they aren't expecting a large amount of turbidity; however, they will keep partners updated on changing conditions that could be impacted by flow. The contractor is responsible for contacting local landowners during this process and the population on the island has decreased by about 25% with the changing seasons.
